History PowerPoint at AVMA

A loop of 56 slides backed by Scott Joplin music will be viewable on a laptop with AVMHS materials on a table near the AVMA 150th Year Exhibit. It was put together by Drs. Like the Exhibit, the musical slide loop features historical facts that have occurred during the 150-year existence of the United States Veterinary Medical Association and its continuation in 1898 with the new name of the American Veterinary Medical Association.

1895 United States Veterinary Convention

Members, please ask around: Are any other state or regional VMAs or specialty organizations you are affiliated with planning to host any history-related talks? Would they be interested in hosting our Society's

6th regional history meeting in 2014, or possibly one in a later year? Thus far, we have had regional history meetings in Kansas, Texas, Iowa, and Ontario, and this year we look forward to Kentucky. A celebration of its own history by a college, a state, or even some other association of veterinarians might encourage its organizers to view a meeting with the American Veterinary Medical History Society more favorably. For instance, we put on a full day program in 1997 with the Association for Women Veterinarians, when it turned 50 years old.

AVMHS Oral Histories Program

Nearly two years ago, the AVMHS worked with the AVMA to conduct an online survey of over 50 State Veterinary Medical Associations and allied associations. The 22 state VMAs that were interested in our oral histories program were AL, AR, AZ, CO, CT, FL, GA, IN, MD, ME, ND, NH, NC, OH, OK, SD, TX, UT, VA, VT, WA, and WI. Lesley Ann Gentry has contacted these state VMAs about conducting oral histories. Thus far, none have reported any interviewing activities or plans.

AVMHS members and friends: If your states are included in the list above, we need you to contact them, NOW! Ask them if they are serious about recording THEIR senior veterinary leaders, mentors, or state veterinary officers that have stories to tell. Please ACT NOW! Remind them that such oral histories are for their state archives, not for the AVMHS. Help your state colleagues find veterinarians who have lived through the great changes in the last seventy-five years and record their oral histories before it's too late.

AVMF Symposium "Understanding Our Past to Transform our Future"

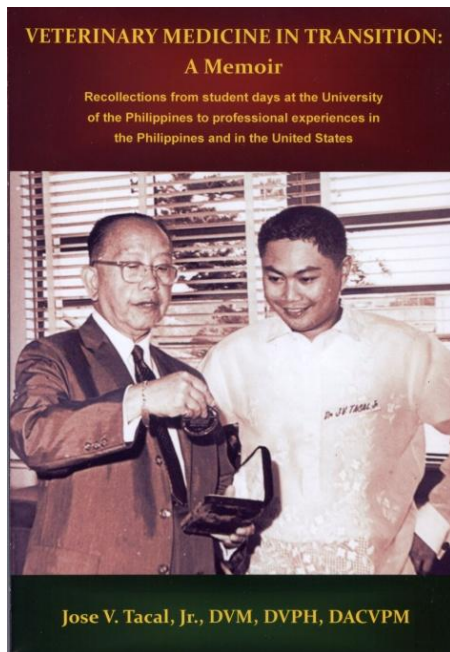


A special scholarship opportunity has been offered to celebrate the AVMA's 150th Anniversary and the

AVMF's 50th Anniversary this year. Students have prepared topics on the history of veterinary medicine for the competition. Eight veterinary students will receive a \$2,500 scholarship prize and travel expenses for the AVMA Annual Convention in Chicago. There, the winners will present their entries at a special day-long symposium on Saturday, July 20.

Dr. Fred Born Talks at NE WVMA Meeting

Last October, Dr. Fred Born presented his PowerPoint lecture on the 2,200 years of veterinary medical history to veterinarians in northeastern Wisconsin. In addition to his lecture entitled, "The Early History of the Horse Doctor," he displayed some 19th to 20th century instruments and framed documents. His announced keynote address enticed three other veterinarians to bring extremely rare instruments, which they donated to the Wisconsin VMA Veterinary Museum in Fond du Lac. One was a 48-inch long, 18-pound, solid stainless steel bovine pelvic splitter. Another was a Dr. Barger's Ear Tattooing Punch with a kick like a 45 mm. pistol, and the third was a large sized cattle trochar and canula.

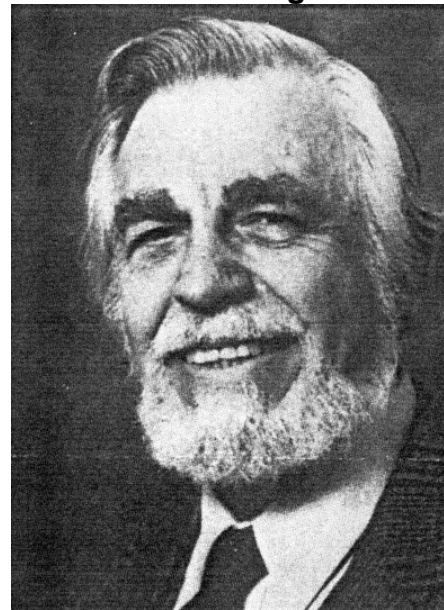
Dr. Jose Tacal's Memoirs

Shomer Rare Books Going to Wisconsin



Robert R. Shomer, VMD (1914-1999) was a small animal practitioner for over 55 years in New Jersey and AVMA House of Delegates member for 34 years. An active collector and history advocate, he served as AVMHS President in 1984/1985 and chaired the Student Essay contest for more than a decade.

Ms. Robin Rider, Curator of History of Science & Special Collections, has reported to Dr. Fred Born that all of the volumes in the Dr. Robert Shomer Rare Book Collection have been accepted by the University of Wisconsin Library System. Almost 2600 rare books, veterinary texts, journals and periodicals from this and ten other collections from the former American Museum of Veterinary Medicine in Pennsylvania have found a new home. They will be transported to Wisconsin soon.

Selected volumes from among the rare veterinary books will be carefully held in the University's rare book collection in the main Memorial Library. Other

selected veterinary texts will be shelved in the Steenbock Memorial Library which covers agriculture and life sciences and the remaining veterinary texts, journals and periodicals will be placed in the University of Wisconsin-School of Veterinary Medicine Library. They will then be accessible to the veterinary students. Official documents for the transfer will be drawn up in the very near future.

AVMA Plans to Modernize Its Logo



As noted recently, the AVMA has begun the process of developing a new logo. No draft of a new logo is yet public. However, the first 40 members of AVMA to respond online to the plan for a new logo disapproved unanimously. As we historians know, the AVMA has had several logos in its 150 year history. The centaur was first chosen in 1863 for the original United States Veterinary Medical Association seal. Years later in 1921, it was replaced by the winged caduceus with superimposed "V" following the lead of the U.S. Army medical, public health, and veterinary units. Most recently, after an 18-year campaign by Dr. Joseph Arburua and others which was not without opposition, the Aesculapian staff was adopted at the AVMA meeting in Las Vegas in 1970. While there is still misuse and confusion between the caduceus and Aesculapian staff, it is generally accepted that the single wingless staff with entwined serpent is, according to Smithcors, the "hereditary symbol of the medical profession."

The Veterinarian in America 1625 to 1975

This 160-page book by Dr. J.F. Smithcors has been scanned to a CD-ROM. Ann Smithcors has given permission for the AVMHS to make these discs available to members and friends. This book is filled with facts and a wide variety of illustrations. It provides a firm overview of veterinary medicine up through the many major changes in the 20th Century.

Sources for Older Full-Text Online Books

For historians doing research or anyone wanting to read what has been written in the past, the viewing of historical veterinary texts online is getting easier thanks to a number of recent national library digitization efforts. AVMHS members may be interested to learn that four major databases or repositories of scanned books, serials, and other materials are available. However, it will not be possible to view copyright protected titles published after 1923.

BHL is an ongoing project sponsored by a consortium of ten natural history museum libraries, botanical libraries, and research institutions. Content is either in the public domain or, if it is copyrighted, permission has been received to make it freely available. BHL includes the digitized text of nearly 57,000 biology-related texts, journals, and guides, including some in veterinary medicine. For example,

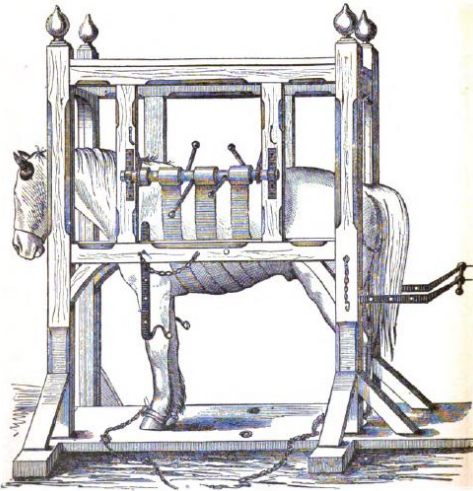


Fig. 16, “The Stock” shown on page 28 of Liautard’s 1892 *Manual of Veterinary Operative Surgery*.

The HathiTrust, a consortium of major research libraries based at the University of Michigan, was established in part to provide a repository for titles scanned by Google. Pronounced “ha-tee” (which means “elephant” in Hindi), it currently provides citation only or full-text access to nearly 11 million titles. Again, anyone in the United States may view non-copyright protected titles. For example,
