What Are Heritage Veterinary Practices


From their beginnings in America, veterinarians have established veterinary practices through which to provide health care for animals—from the lone “horse doctor” making house calls in a buggy to today’s high-tech, multi-center partnerships.

These practices may have undergone name changes, or split into several hospitals. They may have remained in the same location, renovated buildings, or moved to different addresses. Other practices may have had several owners or been passed down to generations of family members, but all have provided continuous veterinary care for horses, small animals, or other species, and surely enriched the communities they have served through the decades.

Joining the REGISTRY

Inclusion in the REGISTRY involves submitting an application. This includes:

- 1-page application form
- Brief supporting documentation, such as chronological time line, narrative, published article, Web site printout, or equivalent description of continuous operation.

Owners who know their practices qualify can assemble appropriate background information and submit a REGISTRY application at any time.

Other veterinarians who suspect or wonder if their practices may be old enough will want to do some preliminary historical investigation. This research may involve locating historical records, interviewing previous or retired owners, and consulting other sources in order to piece together a framework and sequential time line before submitting an application.

Applicants are responsible for the content and accuracy of their information.



The public listing will include current practice name, geographic location and year established. In addition, AVMHS will maintain an archival file of applications and background information for confidential consultation and referral purposes.

There is no cost or fee for registering a heritage veterinary practice.
