2025 J.F. SMITHCORS STUDENT VETERINARY HISTORY ESSAY CONTEST

— GUIDELINES FOR ESSAY SUBMISSION — DEADLINE JUNE 5, 2025

Eligibility

- Students must be enrolled in an AVMA-accredited veterinary school; if studying abroad, students must be a citizen of the United States or Canada.
- Students are eligible for only one award each year, although they may submit more than one essay for consideration.
- Students who have previously won a prize or submitted an essay in past years continue to be eligible until graduation.
- Only original essays will be accepted. Essays must not have been published elsewhere before submission, or submitted for publication elsewhere after submission.

Essay Content

Only historical and veterinary topics will be considered. Examples include (but are not limited to):

- Development of treatments, techniques and/or research
- Instruments
- Biologicals or pharmaceuticals
- Diseases or surgery
- Species emphasis
- Veterinary practice and profession in general

- Public health issues
- Legislation related to veterinary medicine
- Veterinarians or veterinary medicine as portrayed in literature, art, or society
- Biographical information (limited to deceased individuals)
- Veterinary colleges and institutions

Essay Preparation and Format

- Essays must be typed and double-spaced (including the references) in 12-point Times New Roman or similar font.
- The maximum essay length is 3,500 words, exclusive of references, illustrations, maps, etc. Please list the word count at the end of your essay.
- All sources must be referenced, including sources of all images (eg, photos, illustrations, maps), even if you took the picture or drew the illustration yourself.
- If you incorporate direct quotes or other exact sentences or phrases, use quotation marks and include the specific page number(s) in the reference citation.
- Format all reference citations consistently and, preferably, according to the National Library of Medicine guidelines. For examples, see www.nlm.nih.gov/bsd/uniform_requirements.html
- Acceptable references include journal articles, books, reports, newspaper pieces, or other authoritative material. Wikipedia is NOT an acceptable reference source.
- NOTE: You may wish to read some tips and advice from a past multiple winner and former contest chair to help you in writing your essay (separate document on AVMHS website).

Submission Process

- Fill out the entry form completely, sign, and date. A completed entry form is required for each essay being submitted.
- *NOTE:* List your name and school affiliation on the entry form only. Do NOT include your name or school on your essay. This is important for the blinded review process.
- Email your completed entry form and essay as separate PDF attachments to the Essay Contest Committee Chair (info below) by **June 5, 2025** (midnight).
- The Committee Chair will confirm receipt by email within 3 days of your submission. If you do not receive such confirmation, please follow up to ensure that email transmission was successful.
- Retain a Word version of your essay for possible future publication in *Veterinary Heritage*.

Essay Evaluation

- Essays undergo blind review by a panel of veterinary judges.
- The judging process takes approximately 8 weeks and possibly longer depending on the number of essays submitted. Announcement of winning essays is anticipated late August/early Sept 2025.
- Evaluation criteria include the following main areas:
 - Historical interest and relevancy
 - Scientific merit, considering accuracy and obvious errors
 - Writing quality, at both the organizational and paragraph/sentence levels
 - Research documentation and references
